****PATIENTS ON LONG-TERM MEDICATION****

The Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons (RCVS) say that we must be seeing our patients on long-term medication every 3 months. Sometimes we can advise you to see one of our nurses, at the free clinics they run if your pet has been well. Although every other visit your pet will need to see a Vet. As you can appreciate every patient will have different needs and this will not always apply. To ensure we are keeping to the RCVS

regulations we need to check every prescription that we hand out with a Vet. If you need more medication please call to order it in advance so that it can be checked and dispensed ready and waiting for you.



Advice for cat owners purchasing Lilies:

1. Lilies are potentially very dangerous to cats if eaten.
2. All lilies and all parts of the lily are thought to be toxic to cats.
3. Lilies are not toxic in other animals.
4. The part of the flower bearing pollen should be removed if possible, as it is usually the pollen that rubs onto the cat's fur and is then eaten when a cat grooms itself.
5. Lilies should be carefully placed in positions where cats are not likely to come into contact with them.
6. If your cat has eaten part of a lily, seek veterinary treatment immediately. If pollen is visible on the fur, trim the fur off to prevent grooming on your way to the practice. Failure to find veterinary care is likely to be fatal in 50 to 100 percent of cats.
